#### **Reentry Focus**

About 6 months ago, the Reentry Task Force was restarted. The approach is to mentor committed Christians being released from prison. It starts with the mentor and mentee having contact before release, then on release mentoring that individual one on one. This approach involves a local church body that will meet and greet the individual. The Lord has raised up Christian men and women who are available to mentor those being released in the Concord, Nashua, and Manchester areas. The key to a successful mentoring program is to have Christian chaplains in the prison to identify those individuals before release—and we have them in the Concord men's and women's prisons and in the Berlin prison. Christian Aftercare Ministries is a big part in this approach, as CAM as been mentoring men for years.

Because the Lord has blessed CAM financially, we are able in turn to bless Matt, Dennis, and now Tim with financial support. ## Three Strands Treatment Center, Part 1

At 57 years of age, the Lord began calling me to a different career path to use the gifts I had developed as a volunteer in the state prison. I returned to school in Addiction Counseling and after 3 years earned my degree in Addiction Counseling and received state licensure as a licensed alcohol and drug counselor (LADC). With my degree and as a clinician, I saw a need for more affordable treatment, thus Three Strands Treatment Center was developed.

A division of Helping Hands, Three Strands Treatment Center is a clinical treatment center dedicated to helping the "least of these," men coming from prison, homelessness, and residential outpatient programs. Three Strands Treatment Center began in September 2020. God opened doors to make this possible.

The name Three Strands is based on this scripture verse:

**Ecclesiastes 4:12 (ESV):** A threefold cord is not quickly broken.

I use this verse because it reflects the accountability and fellowship needed to help each other out during the client's treatment program and long-term recovery. Isolation is at the core of addiction; by holding each other accountable, it helps increase the chances of long-term recovery.

#### MY PERSONAL TESTIMONY

Brothers and sisters, if someone is caught in a sin, you who live by the Spirit should restore that person gently.

But watch yourselves, or you also may be tempted.

Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. (Galatians 6:1–2, NIV)

As a child I was caught up in a child sex ring for over 10 years, from the age of 4 to 15. It was run by my uncle and many of his friends. My life was a living hell, and I could tell no one about it for fear of my life and others.

At age 10, I found someone I could trust, or so I thought. I confided in him, telling him what was happening to me, and in return, he began abusing me. From then on, I trusted no one. I grew up confused about who I was and what I was, so I continued to struggle with my sexuality and relationships with family and friends. I kept them at a distance so they wouldn't find out what a monster I was. Then I began abusing, which caused me to isolate from the world.


As I grew up, I hated who I was and what I was doing. One night, after work, I decided to end my life. I went home to plan how to make my death look like an accident so no one would know it was suicide. Out of habit, I turned on the TV, and there was a preacher speaking. His words pierced my heart. I fell to the floor in a flood of tears crying out to God to save me. Immediately, I felt a great deal of relief, but I did not fully understand what I had done, and for many years I floundered around with no real direction. Finally, I got connected to a church and enjoyed fellowship and encouragement, but my insides were still in turmoil. I was living a lie and was overwhelmed with guilt every time I stepped into church. So I ran.

I set out to control my own life. I tried to escape in work. I figured if I kept busy enough and stayed away from everyone, I could control my sexual sin, but I failed miserably. I started offending again. But God kept tugging at my heart. He would not let me go.

The conviction of the Holy Spirit was more than I could bear. I cried out to God for help. Immediately, I knew what I had to do, confess! I needed to be clean.

Jonah 2:2 (NIV): "In my distress I called to the LORD, and he answered me. From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry."

I needed to openly confess my sins to my victims and their families. I needed to



But those words never came. Instead, he hugged me and told me, "I don't like what you have done, but I'm here to help you. You're broke, but you can be fixed."

This was the first time I ever experienced real love. It was confusing, but it felt good. During the next 13 months, while I was out on bail, I slowly started to understand what Jesus was all about. I started to understand His love. He showed it to me through the church. The Holy Spirit worked through the loving fellowship, the Bible studies, and the hours and hours of counseling to begin to restore my soul and bring me back into the service of Christ.

When I came to prison, I was as peace for the first time in my life, and I was free. I spent 21 years in prison and met many men who did not receive the same restorative love from their churches. They were cast aside by their churches and came to prison questioning, "Is God real?" They cannot trust because of the hurt of having been condemned by society and the church. They have nowhere to turn. They believe what Satan and others tell them, that they are worthless, and they fall further into anger and bitterness.

I continually praise God for all that He has brought me through. He has used my experiences, good and bad, even my sin, to help me relate to others and bring comfort, encouragement, and help (2 Corinthians 1:3–7).



The love that my church "on the street" gave to me, I was able to pass on to the church behind the walls. I now attend Grace Capitol in Concord and am surrounded with Christian friends.

## Helping Hands Chaplain Has Written Two Companion Books


