#### GOD'S SUCCESS STORIES

**As** Chaplain at Rockingham County Department of Corrections, I have the awesome privilege of ministering to inmates. Over the years I have witnessed many "jailhouse conversions," but only a few are truly God's success story. The typical inmate who goes to Chapel for services and Bible studies, finds God while being incarcerated. However, when they return to society, God suddenly becomes no longer first in their lives. The sad result is many will return to prison because of the wrong decisions they will make independent from God.

For those who stay close to God it makes my job all the more meaningful. Gerry is one of God's success stories I was directly involved with.

Gerry came into my facility after serving many years at state prison. He was labeled as "porker," as he was rather large, weighing over 350 lbs. To those who really knew him, he was a "Gentle Ben." Gerry came to love God. It was a special day when he received Christ as his Lord and Savior.

For years he had been struggling with self-esteem and now had victory over this. He vowed to Serve God faithfully, especially after he was released to society. Gerry is one of God's success stories because he has remained faithful by staying close to God. He has continued to put into practice the tools he learned while at my facility. Recently Gerry called me to say he was getting married again, only this time to a Christian who loves him as Jesus does.

Gerry is one of the fortunate ones, because he has had a network of caring individuals willing to help him with his walk with the Lord. It saddens me to see men on fire for God leave, and then fall back into sin because they walk away from God after their release from jail. What helped Gerry make it was the "Barnabas" that came into his life prior to his release from jail. Having that accountability partner to share with is invaluable. The key we find in our experience with inmates, is a true committed relationship with Jesus PRIOR to release.

**There** is a tremendous need for volunteers to become mentors, prayer warriors, and be willing to work to help those who deserve a second chance.

When I became a board member of CAM, I brought into this ministry the burden to help inmates make it. As CAM has grown with the pressing need to provide not just the bare essentials, but to recruit and train volunteers willing to be mentors, chaperones, escorts, and accountability partners. Matthew 25:43 says, "I was a stranger and you did not invite Me in, naked, and you did not clothe Me; sick, and in prison, and you did not visit Me." Please ask God how you may help us in CAM. We need more of God's success stories.

#### MY PERSONAL TESTIMONY By David Devine

I gave my life to Christ when I was ten years old and it seems I have spent the majority of my life doing everything I could do to try to take it back from Him.

As an adult, I used the excuses I was "making up" for all the things, and fun, I missed as a child ... after all, I came from a broken home. had a drunken father and a mother who was not there for me! I mean, who would blame or find fault in me for that?

All the while, the Lord would bless me in so many ways despite my efforts to push Him out. The more I pushed, the more He seemed to bless me ... and I would work very hard to mess it up.

As a result, my life was full of disappointment and pain. There was this big "hole" inside of me that I just could not fill, no matter what I did. Sex and drugs were my life, and my life was a living hell. but hey, at least I was calling the shots and hanging on to the illusion that I was in control.

I finally hit "rock bottom." I found myself in the county jail awaiting trial on criminal charges. While there, I met a former pastor who asked me, "Are you saved?" I answered, "I really don't know ... I think I am." That day, that hour, I put that question to rest. I prayed to the Lord saying, "My life is over. If you can make anything out of what is left ... then I'm yours!" That prayer changed my life for good.

During the seven years I spent in prison I know the Lord was with me. He placed many different people in my life to walk with me and help me understand that God indeed had a plan for my life.

I can't say everything is the way I would have had it to be. What I can say is that (my life) is more stable and better than it has been before. Oh yeah ... I still struggle with trying to do it my way. However, I am learning despite my best efforts.

The Lord has used the wonderful godly people of "Christian Aftercare" to give me the support and hope that (I so) desperately needed. I think of Jean Metzger's Bible studies, and how she personally made sure I had clothes when (Continued Next Page)

#### THE LORD'S WORK INSIDE THE WALLS

Many of you have heard the comment that it is far easier to be a Christian inside the walls than it is after you are released.

The concept of aftercare is to provide help, encouragement, and guidance when a person is released, but the Christian journey starts well before release.

The key to a successful Christian re-entry starts inside the walls, with individuals making a 100 % heart-changing commitment to walk with Jesus. That requires the individuals, after having been convicted by the Holy Spirit of their need to change, confess their sins and accept Jesus as Savior, they must then be overwhelmed by the Lord's wonderful mercy in transforming their lives. As they start to praise the Lord for blessing their lives, the journey to becoming a committed Christian starts. Their faith grows, they start reading the Bible, and they want to please Jesus. They quickly realize the importance of Christian fellowship provided by Bible studies, chapel services, Christian recovery programs and prayer time. How faithful they are in attending these opportunities for growth is a measure of their commitment to Jesus.

In New Hampshire, the Lord has provided doors open to the Gospel in all the jails and prisons in the state. Hundreds of Christian Volunteers who go in and do Bible studies, lead Christian programs like Alpha, and do weekend seminars (Prison Fellowship and Kairos). In addition to all this, the Christian inmates do their own Bible studies in the pods and in the process hold one another accountable for their walk.

As a ministry, our ongoing prayer is that the Lord will use <u>all</u> the Christians (inmates and volunteers) to share Jesus with every person incarcerated in New Hampshire.
