

CAM Is a Support Network

In past newsletters, I've mentioned the wonderful work the Concord re-entry group does. I attended their meeting on June 19 and was overwhelmed with the number of Christian volunteers the Lord has raised up for this ministry to men and women being released from prison. CAM is well represented in this group with Steve Fulk, Steve Micucci, Ernie Kilman, and myself. The women volunteers (about 8) minister to, mentor, and help not only women who have been released but also those inside the women's state prison and at Shea Farm (woman's prison halfway house) as they are close to being released, providing Bible studies, prayer, and encouragement. The bottom line is that sincere, born-again believers get out of prison and are overwhelmed with all the support they need to successfully re-enter society—support such as prayer, rides, food, mentoring, encouragement, rides to church, clothes, phones ... the list goes on.

At the office, the prison halfway house Calumet has been calling on a regular basis and sending at least 2 or 3 men down every Monday. We also continue to help men living here at Helping Hands. Finally, I just read a prison story about an inmate in the New York prison system. He blamed America, society, police, and everybody else for prisons. Well, what a difference in NH with Christian ministries! We value each inmate, treat them with respect, and tell them about Jesus.

I have known Paul since volunteering in the prison in 2000. His passion for prison ministry and the love he showed to the men that others could not love was genuine and heartfelt (Matt 18:12-14).

Paul wanted all men in the prisons and jails (Paul's sheep) to find the love of Christ that we all have found. He never gave up on any one, always encouraging them that their lives could be changed. He joined us in prayer every week praying for sobriety, for a relationship with Jesus for the men, and financial blessings for our transitional sober house. He genuinely cared and showed compassion and the love of Jesus everyday. Paul recently worked with a resident at Helping Hands who is facing pending prison time. Paul led this young man to Christ, was a constant encourager to him, and had prayer time with him every week. He shared that praying was more powerful than any potential sentence and God could work His miracles and set captives free.

MY PERSONAL TESTIMONY, Part 1

It is truly a blessing to share what Jesus Christ is doing in my life.

Psalm 103, verses 1–5 say our Father through Jesus Christ forgives all our iniquities, heals all our diseases, redeems our life from destruction. He crowns us with loving kindness and mercy. He satisfies our mouth with good things. Verses 11–12 say He removes our sins as far as the east is from the west, and verse 12 says the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting.

I was born January 25, 1952. My dad was in the Air Force and my mom was a registered nurse. I also have a sister and brother; my mom was the spiritual leader of the family and ensured that we went to church weekly.

My childhood was rocky and filled with sexual, physical, and verbal abuse. This environment often made me feel unsafe and unwanted. At 12 years old, I had accepted Jesus Christ as my personal Savior on Easter Sunday, March 29, 1964, at Getchell Street Baptist Church in Waterville, Maine.

As a young person, I struggled with ongoing sexual and verbal abuse. Even then, God was beginning to work in me. He started pulling me away from the abuse and called me to share the Good News!

From ages 12 to 22, the Holy Spirit led me to speak in churches in central Maine and travel to Haiti to share the Gospel. During this time, I was given the opportunity to work with David Wilkerson, the founder of Teen Challenge, within New York City.

I was married at the age of 23. My wife and I raised three children. God helped me to overcome my addiction, until I stumbled in 1988. This poor choice would have a profound impact on my life and my family later in life. Because of my choice, I was sent to prison where I lost my home, family, friends, and freedom.

My first night in county jail, the person that was bunking with me prayed for me as I asked the Lord for forgiveness.
